Large Membership, High Morale Bode Well For Rockledge

Greetings from Ithaca. As we begin the spring 2002 semester, morale is high, and attitudes toward the future are positive. Returning from winter break, the brothers found the old, deteriorating bathroom on the second floor of the house replaced by a fabulous, brand-new bathroom, which was made possible by the corporation board and the generous donations of our alumni. Additionally, we took in a pledge class of 17 men this spring, bringing the total number of undergraduate brothers to 62, the largest the house has been in years. Many houses on campus have been struggling with numbers or with following national regulations, but here at Rockledge we have only gotten stronger, and the future of the house looks bright.

Rush was very successful this spring, thanks largely to the efforts of Rush Chair Mike Summersgill '03, and our newest pledge class is poised and ready to help carry Rockledge through the upcoming years. The pledges seem enthusiastic about learning the ins and outs of the house, improving the physical structure, and continuing to spread the positive

Bathroom Remodeling Finally Complete

During winter break the corporation board financed the complete remodeling of the second-floor bathroom. The board proposed the idea to the current brothers over Homecoming, and as house manager, I contacted several contractors to get estimates for the work. The corporation board—made up of President David Poggi, Russ Kellner, Jeff Snedeker, Christopher Massing, and Tom Hunter—evaluated the proposals and approved the construction in December.

Lasting approximately three weeks, the project involved the total overhaul of the mold-covered, leaking, and antiquated facility into a new, beautiful bathroom. The work began with the demolition and removal of the existing toilets, stalls, ceiling, rotting walls, and floor. In all, over seven tons of cement, tile, and

other debris were removed. With walls and floor rebuilt, every surface except for the ceiling was retiled. The ceiling was painted with mold-resistant paint, and the windows

and frames were replaced. Only two new toilets were brought in, though, with a urinal replacing the third one nearest the showers. New sinks, countertop, and mirror also went in. For our female guests, new stalls—not only with doors, but with doors that latch closed—were also installed. In addition, a dividing partition replaced the center showerhead.

This project would not have been possible without the generous support of the Rockledge alumni. Your donations to the house via the corporation board are making a difference. On behalf of all of the current and future brothers, I want to thank you very much for your dedication to the brotherhood. Please come by to visit us and have a look at the new bathroom.

Rockledge Searches For Faculty Fellow

This past semester the academic chair was given a daunting task. It has become necessary for Rockledge to obtain a faculty fellow—a professor who clearly has a connection with his students and who represents the ideals of Alpha Sig.

There was a time when faculty members would join brothers at house dinners on Sunday nights. As times have changed, however, the brotherhood—as well as the Greek community as a whole—has grown apart from the faculty. Perhaps this represents a societal trend that de-emphasizes the importance of education and respect for elders. Or maybe it is the faculty that has distanced itself from Greeks as reports of hazing and binge drinking become more frequent.

Whatever the cause, the brotherhood believes it is time once again to improve our relations with the faculty. There is

speculation that a faculty fellow will soon become mandatory for each house, so the brotherhood is attempting not only to gain a faculty fellow, but to improve our relations with the administration by obtaining one before it is mandatory.

Some houses want faculty fellows to play an enormous role; in fact, I talked to one who was actually an initiated brother at a certain fraternity. Other houses want a faculty fellow in name only, to appease the administration. We aim to find a middle ground between these two extremes—a professor who can be utilized for tutoring and recommendations and help us develop into young adults without sharing our house's cherished secrets.

This is an ongoing process, and brothers have given me the names of numerous professors who might fill this role. I will meet with each candidate personally and then share my impressions with the brotherhood, after which we will vote on the candidates. The benefits clearly outweigh the costs, and this is a win-win situation that can further the ideals of the Old Gal.
